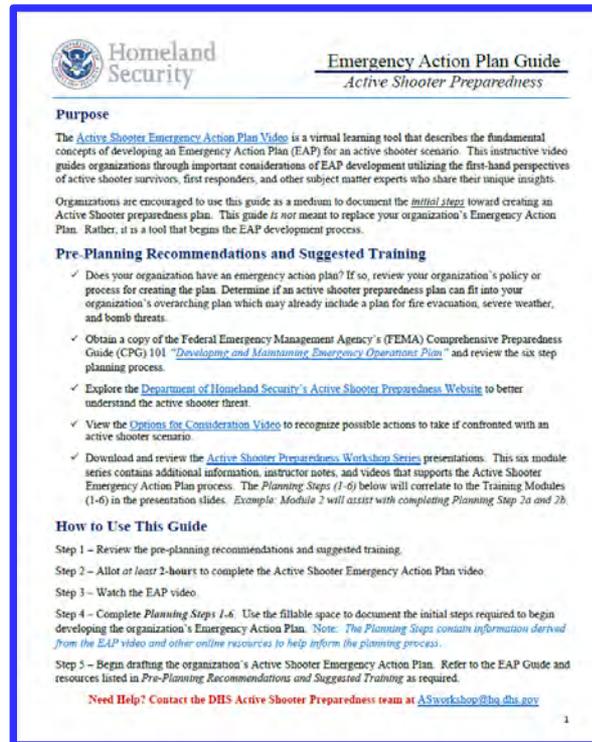
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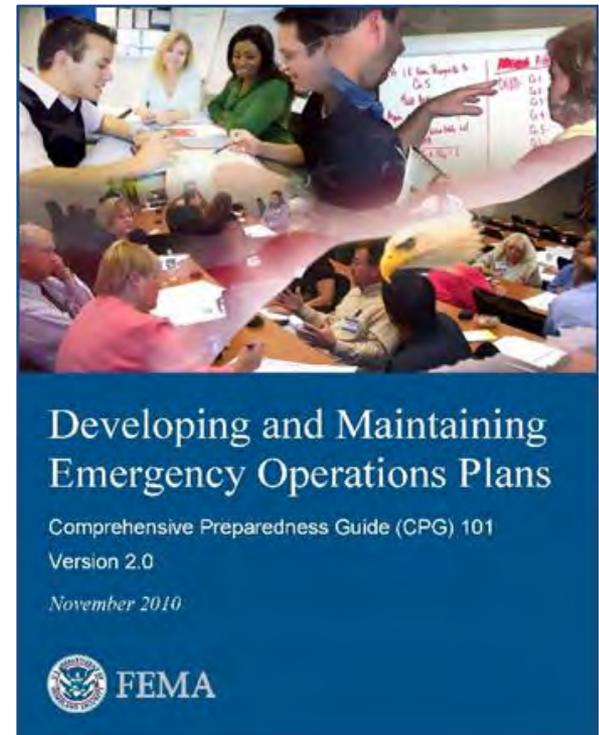
Preparedness Planning

A preparedness plan typically will address five areas:

- Prevention
- Protection
- Mitigation
- Response
- Recovery

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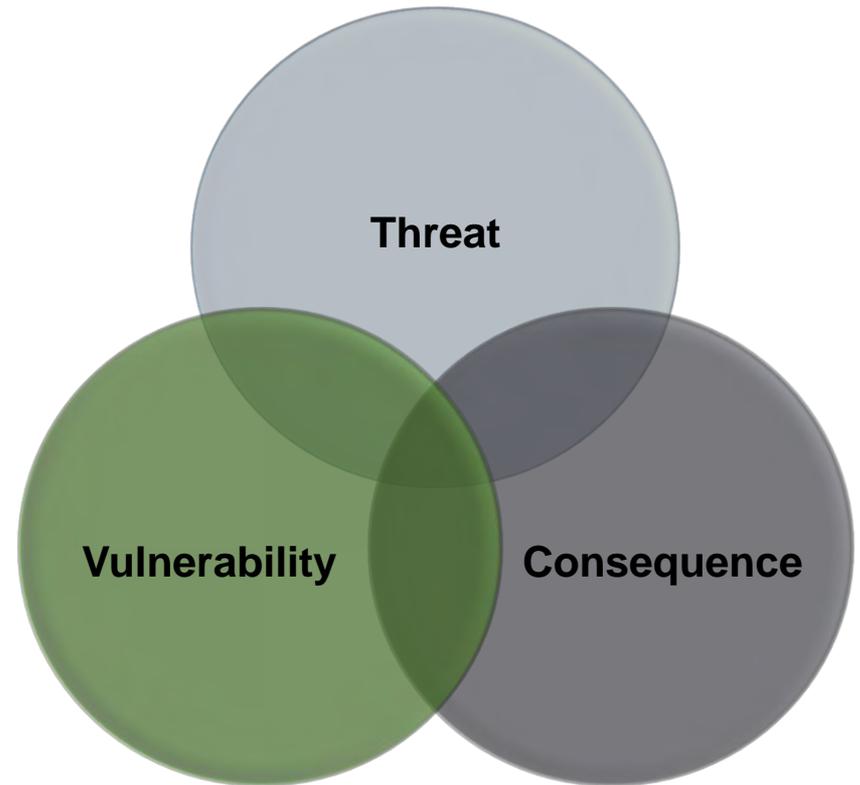
Risk Analysis

Risk is the potential for an unwanted outcome from an incident; it has three components:

- Threat
- Vulnerability
- Consequence

Assessing risk will help you:

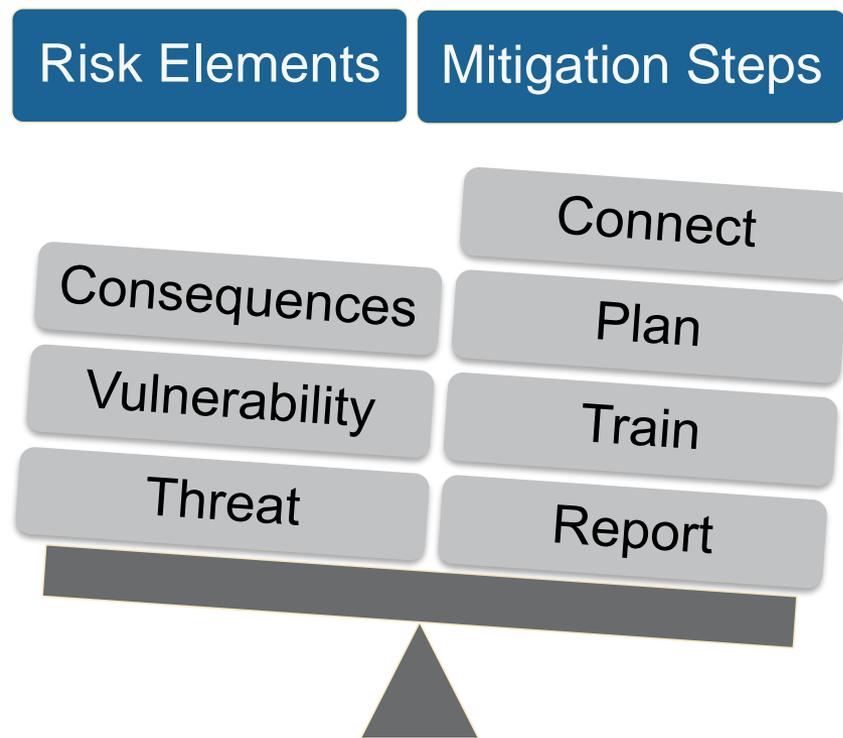
- Understand your situation
- Prioritize actions
- Identify and compare options
- Allocate resources



Mitigating Risk

There are three important elements to help reduce the negative impact of any disaster, including an active shooter incident:

- Assess risk
- Identify best practices
- Implement mitigation steps



Risk Assessment and Mitigation Options

To help schools better understand risk and potential options for consideration to mitigate those risks, DHS published K-12 School Security: A Guide for Preventing and Protecting Against Gun Violence.

- The Guide is delivered in two parts:
 1. A narrative introduction to security for K-12 institutions
 2. A voluntary self-assessment for schools

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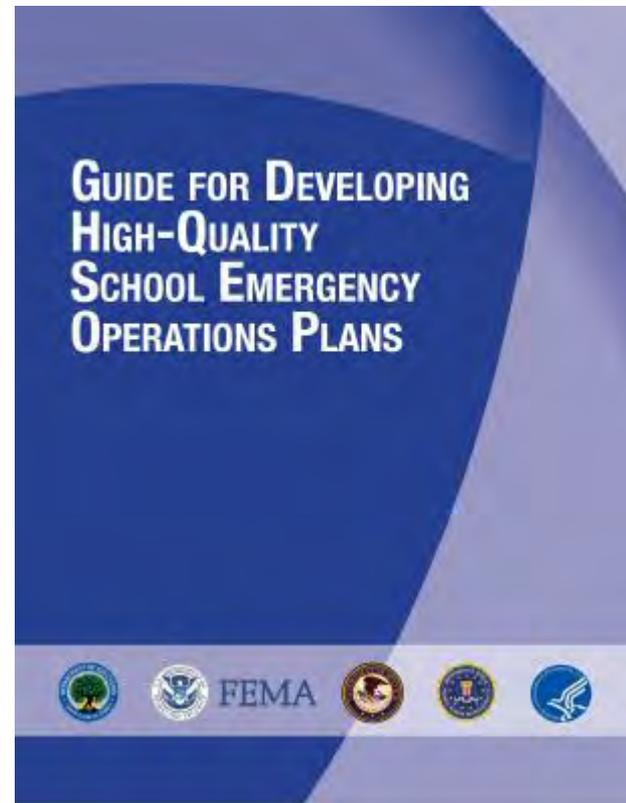
Drafting and Reviewing Plans

Best Practices for Writing the Plan

- Use simple language
- Use short, active voice sentences
- Give enough detail to convey easily understood, actionable guidance
- Focus on mission guidance

Considerations for Reviewing the Plan

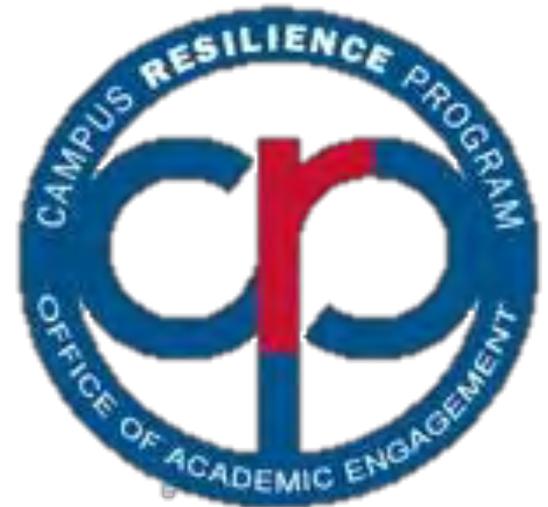
- Adequacy
- Feasibility
- Acceptability
- Completeness
- Compliance



Exercising the Plan

In 2018, DHS released Exercise Starter Kits for institutions of higher education and K-12 schools. These are self-conducted tabletop exercises which may validate existing plans, policies, and procedures and elicit areas for improvement. The kits include:

- An Exercise Conduct Briefing
- A Situation Manual
- A Facilitator Guide
- A Participant Feedback Form Template
- An After-Action Report Template

Regardless of exercise type, each builds on a set of common program priorities and tests capabilities.

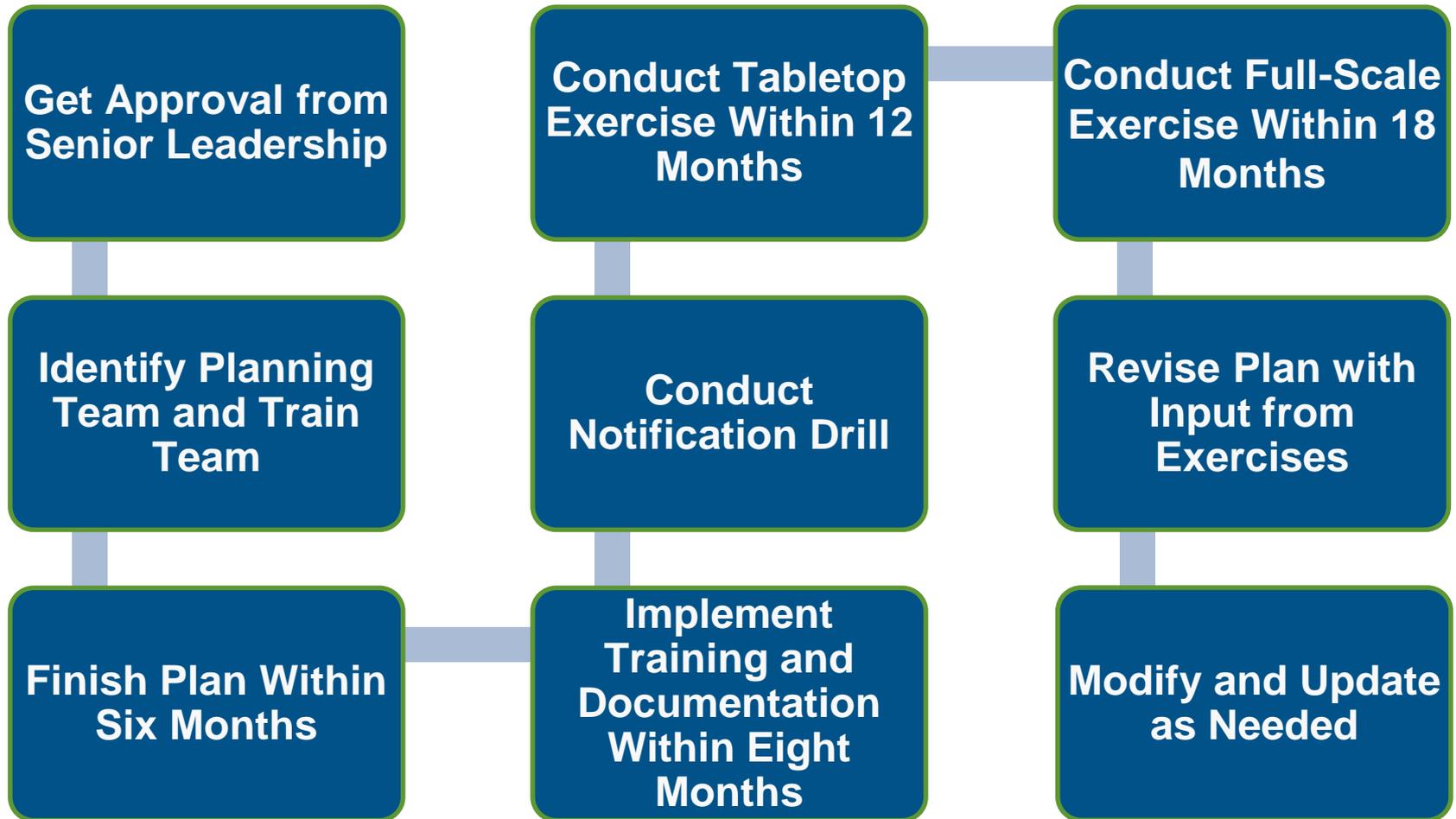
